## 1. What is this course about?

#### 1.1. Description

This course allows you to investigate pathways to a career in creative industries and the skills and strategies required by professional creative practitioners. These include knowledge of industrial and employment norms, awareness of ethical and regulatory issues for establishing creative enterprises and capabilities in self-development, career planning and professional communication. The course addresses the importance of developing a distinctive professional identify as a creative industries practitioner.

## All - Assessment Task 2: Establish Business Practices (Intellectual Property)

This report will outline your understanding of the key IP management concepts and contain completed draft legal documentation for various IP agreements.
