1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

This Work Integrated Learning (WIL) course is designed to provide you with an opportunity to experience the workplace and work in your chosen profession, while enhancing your employability skillset and expanding your professional network. You will apply the knowledge and skills gained from your university studies to workplace tasks and activities while at the same time, seek to develop new knowledge and professional skills in the workplace. You must perform satisfactorily in all assessment tasks and complete a minimum 96 hours of vocational placement to pass this course.

10.1. Assessment: Academic Integrity

This course will be graded as Pass in a Limited Grade Course (PU) or Fail in a Limited Grade Course (UF) as per clause 5.1.1.3 and 5.1.1.4 of the Grades and Grade Point Average (GPA) - Academic Policy.

In a course eligible to use Limited Grades, all assessment items in that course are marked on a Pass/Fail basis and all assessment tasks are required to be passed for a student to successfully complete the course. Supplementary assessment is not available in courses using Limited Grades.
