1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

This course examines the international legal frameworks governing business transactions and cross-border business activity. Students explore the operation of key international conventions and agreements and analyse their implications for Australian and multinational enterprises. Emphasis is placed on risk management, dispute resolution, comparative regulatory systems, and emerging legal issues in the context of global business.

10.3. Assessment: Submission penalties
