1.1. Description

This course equips students with foundational and advanced skills in business analysis. Students will learn to identify business needs, elicit and document requirements, assess potential solutions, and support successful organisational change and strategic initiatives. Emphasis is placed on critical thinking, stakeholder communication, and analytical techniques to solve complex business problems.

10.2. Assessment: Additional Requirements

Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

Your eligibility for supplementary assessment in a course is dependent of the following conditions applying:

- (a) The final mark is in the percentage range 47% to 49.4%; and
- (b) The course is graded using the Standard Grading scale

10.3. Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submissions may be penalised up to and including the following maximum percentage of the assessment task's identified value, with weekdays and weekends included in the calculation of days late:

- (f) Six days: deduct 80%;

More than 30 minutes: 100% penalty
