# 1.1. Description

In this course you will learn about (1) creating digital assets, and (2) leveraging digital assets. In today's fast-paced and competitive digital environment, digital merchants must demonstrate high levels of awareness and strong business judgement. You will learn about creating non-fungible tokens (NFTs) and strategies for promoting the intrinsic value of digital assets. Further, you will learn about strategies for strong digital business judgement and leadership.
