1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

In this course you develop foundational midwifery knowledge and skills. You undertake clinical experience placements across the maternity care continuum (120 hours). You will be supported and supervised by experienced practitioners and critically self-appraise your practice. Your facilitator will evaluate your work at an introductory student level against the NMBA Midwife Standards for Practice. In addition, you will work towards meeting the required midwifery practice experiences for the program and continue your Continuity of Care experiences (CONNECT).

Antenatal assessment and care

Safe medication administration – oral

Safe medication administration – intramuscular and subcutaneous

Early labour assessment, nitrous oxide and water immersion

Vaginal examination, intermittent auscultation, perineal compresses

Normal vaginal birth and variations of normal

Birth of the placenta, postnatal assessment of the woman and newborn

Assessment and care of the newborn, infant nutrition, postnatal care and discharge planning
