1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

This course builds upon your previous clinical professional experiences, advancing your competency in planning and implementing comprehensive nursing care. You will develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills through hands-on practice, including simulation labs and clinical placement. The emphasis is on safe medication administration, patient assessment, and nursing interventions, guided by the National Safety and Quality Health Standards (NSQHS) and NMBA registered nurse standards for practice.

GOAL: The goal of your Professional Experience Placement is to provide you with authentic opportunities to apply your learning in real healthcare settings, develop your skills under supervision, and demonstrate your progress against the NMBA Registered Nurse Standards for Practice using the Australian Nursing Standards Assessment Tool (ANSAT). PRODUCT: Placement performance FORMAT: 1. Completion of required hours: You must complete the allocated placement hours for your course. Evidence of attendance and completion will be recorded in Sonia and must be submitted to finalise your placement. 2. Progressive assessment: During your placement, you will engage in regular feedback and reflection with your facilitator. This process helps you review your practice, track your progress against the ANSAT criteria, and identify strategies to support your success. 3. Final assessment: At the end of placement, your clinical facilitator/preceptor will complete the summative ANSAT based on your overall performance. The ANSAT is then submitted to the course coordinator for review and final approval of results in line with UniSC assessment policies. Ongoing feedback and support: You will receive formative feedback throughout your placement as part of your professional development. If any areas of concern arise, a learning plan will be developed in partnership with you to quide improvement and ensure you have every opportunity to meet the required standards. 4. Professional expectations: You are expected to maintain safe practice at all times in line with the NMBA Code of Conduct for Nurses and the ICN Code of Ethics. Unsafe practice, breaches of professional standards, or behaviours that place patients at risk may result in removal from placement and failure of the course. 5. Supportive pathways to success: If a learning plan is required, you will be supported to meet all requirements before the final assessment. Successful completion of your Professional Experience Placement requires both full attendance of allocated hours and achievement of the required ANSAT at the developing level.
