1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

In your fourth professional experience placement (PEP) you will apply the professional principles, knowledge and skills that you have developed. In a 160 hour PEP, you will have the opportunity to plan, prioritise and manage person centred care for a number of people in a range of care settings, underpinned by quality and safety standards. You will be supported and supervised by experienced practitioners and engage with a range of health professionals. You will critically self-appraise your practice and your facilitator will evaluate your performance using the NMBA Registered nurse standards for practice at a level consistent with a transitioning student.

You need complete all the required hours and meet a satisfactory level of performance in all standards for practice. The summat ANSAT will be submitted to the course coordinator for final judgement. 10.1. Assessment: Academic Integrity
